FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

- **Do you know someone who can't make it to the polls due to a disabling condition?** In Ohio, individuals with a personal illness, physical disability, or infirmity may be eligible to have a provisional ballot delivered to them. - **Can an ex-offender vote in Ohio?** This varies based on the type of conviction. An otherwise qualified person convicted of a misdemeanor may vote. A person currently serving time in jail or prison for a felony conviction can neither register to vote nor vote while incarcerated. However, an otherwise qualified person convicted of a felony may register and vote while on probation or parole, or after completing his or her jail or prison sentence. Ex-offenders with felony convictions must re-register to vote. Full details here – [Voting as an Ex-offender](#)
- **Can a homeless person vote in Ohio?** The answer is yes – all Americans can register to vote – even if the home address claimed is a park or a corner of two streets. Details here – [Voting and Homelessness](#)
- **Do you know someone who's been a victim of domestic violence and is afraid to register to vote – for fear of having their address discovered?** State administered Address Confidentiality Programs (ACP) and Confidential Voter Listings protect those at risk by providing a substitute address for all public records. **Note** – In this case, it's advised to register at the Board of Elections in person.
